

Vocabulary Set 4

Mood: The feeling created in the reader by a literary work or passage.

- The mood is often suggested by descriptive details.
- Often the mood can be described by a single word, such as lighthearted or frightening.

Tone: The writer's attitude toward his or her audience and subject.

- The tone can often be described by a single adjective, such as formal or informal, serious or playful, bitter or ironic.

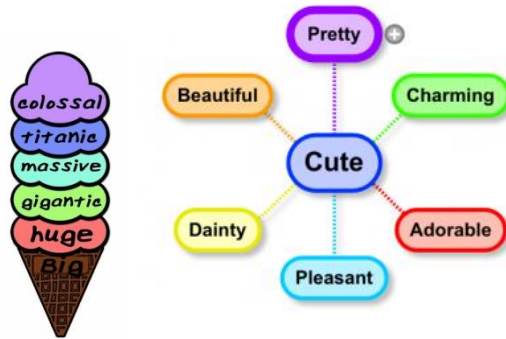
Narration: Writing that tells a story.

- Novels and short stories are fictional NARRATIVES.

Point of view: Perspective from which the story is told

- First person narrator: Character in the story tells the story
- Third person narrator: When a voice outside the story narrates

Synonym: a word or phrase that means exactly or nearly the same as another word or phrase in the same language, for example *shut* is a synonym of *close*.



Antonym: a word opposite in meaning to another (e.g., *bad* and *good*)
